



The desks were in rows.


- Fewer pictures and more windows.



Screening Laws

Helping keep children safe through new screening laws

Stronger, more effective and transparent screening laws for people working or volunteering with children have been introduced in South Australia. The new screening laws were recommended as part of federal and South Australian royal commissions, to help keep children safe in our communities. The new laws mean that from 1 July 2019 everyone working or volunteering with children must have a valid child-related check.

Also changing from 1 July 2019 is the state's current system for child-related employment screenings, which will be replaced with a working with children check (WWCC). This new check is coming in to better protect your children and make sure that people working or volunteering with children are suitable. It does this through a monitored and more robust assessment of a person's eligibility to work or volunteer with children. Because the check is monitored, immediate action can be taken if a person is charged with a concerning offence. The new check covers off on a person's national criminal history including all spent convictions, pending and non-conviction charges, and other disciplinary and child protection information.

A WWCC is valid for five years and is portable across roles and organisations throughout South Australia.

Current, valid child-related employment screening checks done by DHS/DCSI will be recognised as a WWCC until they expire. There is also a 12 month transition period for anyone with a National Police Certificate assessed by their organisation, with the certificate valid till 1 July 2020.

For most people, this means they don't need to do anything to be ready for the new law starting on 1 July 2019.

Anticipated Changes to 2020 Enrolment 'Registration of Interest' Cut Off Dates

Enrolment Protocols for East Marden Primary School are anticipated to change to improve customer service across the Felixstow area of schools. The purpose of these changes is to standardise 'Registration of Interest' cut off dates and enrolment offers/acceptance dates within schools in our area.

The impact of these proposed changes is that 'Registration of Interest' for enrolment at East Marden Primary School for 2020 will close Week 10, Term 2, Friday 5th July instead of Week 5, Term 3 as currently listed in the 'Capacity Management Plan'.

We recommend all families with 'Sibling Rights' to ensure they have completed a 'Registration of Interest' form before 5th July 2019. All families living within the East Marden Primary School zone are advised to also complete 'Registration of Interest' forms by this date if their child turns four years of age in 2019.

STEM

On the 27th and 28th of May, Rocco C, Skyla C, Lukas S, Talan H, Kirsten K-B, Aiden K-B, and Charlize C attended the Aboriginal Student STEM congress, Living in Two Worlds, an event that celebrated ATSI culture and science, and aimed to encourage students to pursue STEM subjects in high school and beyond. This year the event was bigger than ever, with hundreds of students attending workshops at the Adelaide Convention Centre and across the city.





On the first day, the students from East Marden attended two workshops where they learned to fly Micro Drones, and heard about the ways Seaton High students are using them in Years 11 and 12, and had the chance to illustrate parts of the Thukari dreaming in Virtual Reality (VR). They also heard from David Ratham, an elder and author who spoke to the students about the importance of connecting with their families and learning about

On the second day, the group learned about geology and explored rocks and soil with XX from the University of Adelaide. For the final workshop, our group travelled to the Migration Museum where we looked at the ways mapping

differed between the Kaurna people and the early Colonists. Students explored mapping techniques using antique and modern surveying tools and even attempted to map the courtyard of the Migration Museum using these techniques.

The two days were great learning opportunities, and helped excite all students about all the possibilities a pathway in STEM could bring them.

On the 3rd of June, April W and Daniel L represented East Marden as our STEM Student Ambassadors at a conference held at the Adelaide Oval. This was an incredibly interesting day, where students from schools across the state attended to share their 2018 projects, network, and begin to talk about and plan their goals for 2019. It was fascinating to hear about the range of STEM projects that some schools undertook, and we all left with ideas to bring back to East Marden. Watch this space!
