



STEMSEL CLUB

East Marden's STEMSEL Club has been running since 2017, growing from seven students to over forty students in this time. STEMSEL stands for *Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics Social Enterprise Learning*. Students use discipline-specific knowledge and skills to create solutions to social problems; such as minimising electricity or water use, making technology accessible to people with disabilities, or increasing efficiency of recycling processes. Students learn how to code and build a microcomputer circuit, which can include light and temperature sensors, LEDs, motors and Wi-Fi chips.

Once students have familiarised themselves through tutorials, they are ready to find their own problems to solve using the engineering design process. These designs are entered into multiple competitions throughout the year. On Thursday of Week 7, our STEMSEL students were judged in the Royal Adelaide Show Technology competition in the 'Smart City' and 'Smart Farm' categories. Students are required to speak to a panel of judges about their project, justifying their decisions and answering questions. Our team won five ribbons, including **Best Exhibit in Innovation, Invention and Enterprise Robotics** made by a school group. In Term 4, students will begin to make modifications and improvements to their design, ready to enter in the Young ICT Explorers competition in October.

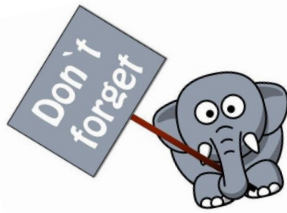

Capacity Management Plan update September 2019

Last week, a new Capacity Management Plan was gazetted in SA Parliament. The new capacity for East Marden PS is 756 students. Because of this, some new vacancies have been created in some year levels and extra registration of interest applications for 2020 can now be considered. Registrations of interest applications can only be received from families living in the school zone. All relevant documentation to show proof of residence and supporting documentation will need to be provided when a registration of interest is made. Families renting a property from a private landlord will be required to provide secondary documentation to support their application. Families will be notified before the end of the year if their registration of interest has been successful.

Year 1 Inquiry Based Learning

The inquiry unit throughout Term 3 that Year 1 classes have focused on has been about how we affect each other and the environment. We have looked at how people care for and meet the needs of different plants, fruits and vegetables. As part of this learning unit, we have planted and cared for broad beans - studying their development and ensuring their needs are being met. Our inquiry concluded with a visit to the Adelaide Botanic Gardens where we were able to observe plants from around the globe and develop our understanding of how different conditions affect their health and growth.

Governing Council Grounds Committee Report

There is an interesting relationship between student learning and the spaces where learning occurs. Good learning can happen anywhere – but the environment can encourage different modes of learning.

This year we have employed the services of Thomson Rossi Architects to undertake a Learning Environment Opportunities Study (LEOS). A LEOS is a strategic review to assess existing facilities and identify opportunities to improve spaces for teaching and learning on the school site.

LEOS is a collaboration between the school community; staff, students, parents and the architects for the timely, long term planning of the site to enhance contemporary curriculum delivery and improve learning outcomes.

There will be opportunities for staff, student, parents to engage with the issues and work together to explore opportunities for our site.

As part of the new system, from time to time students will volunteer to take home a bag of soft plastic to drop off at their local REDcycle collection point. THEY HAVE DONE IT AGAIN!! Many congratulations to our A Grade Team, whose members are now the 2019 SA Primary School Open Champions! This follows their resounding win 5-0 last Friday with a total score of 32.5 points after seven rounds (out of a maximum of 35). Being Primary Team Chess Champions means they are now qualified to represent South Australia in the Division of Primary Open at the annual Australian Schools' Teams Championships (ASTC) in Canberra on Saturday 30th November and Sunday 1st December. Well done!!

It is the second time that our A Grade team has won this prestigious state primary school chess title. Back in 2017, our then A Grade team represented South Australia and was joint national 1st Runner-Up in the Primary Open Division! Let's wish our team luck for a national championship title this time!!

Meanwhile, our B Grade Yellow and C Grade Red teams have also finished at the top of the Preliminary Finals in their playing venues and are now playing at their respective finals at St. Peter's College this Friday 20th September 2019 at 4pm. It is a 4-round progressive tournament with high intensity and excitement with each player having 20 minutes per game! Best of luck to our players!!

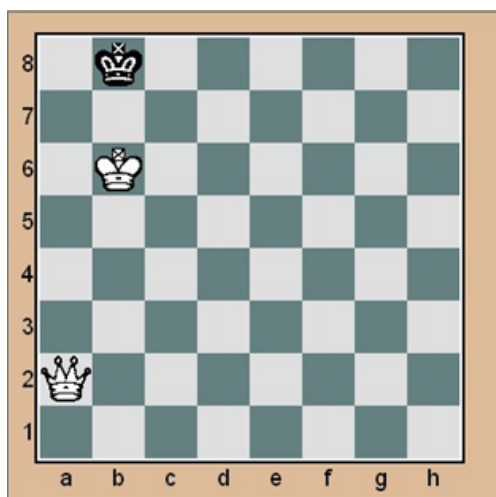
These State Finals take place just two days after another state team chess tournament – the Evelyn Koshnitsky Shield. It is an Invitational event to the most active primary chess schools in the South Australian Junior Chess League (SAJCL) competition to take part in a 3 round competition, with 20 minutes for each player per game, to work out who has the right to hold the Champion Primary School shield for the year.

East Marden Primary School has proudly held the "Best Primary Chess School" title since 2017 and the team this year is drawn from A and B Grade players who have each played very well in the domestic season just finished. Good luck to the EK Shield Team!!

The East Marden Primary School Chess Club meets at lunch on Monday for players in competitions, and on Wednesday in the OSHC room which is open to students of all levels.

*Fun Fact: Chess can take you around the world! This year the World U16 Olympiad chess Olympiad will take place in Turkey from 28th October - 6th November and coach David Koetsier will be the official Team Manager/Coach for the Australian Junior Team. **This means, there will be no chess at East Marden in week 3 and week 4 in Term 4,** but it means you can ask him all about the trip from week 5 onwards!*

Solution:

To achieve a mate in one, you must first find a way to put the opposing king in check. A check is not a checkmate if the opposing king has a way to escape it.

Here, the answer is to move the white queen to g8. That puts the black king in check and it can't escape. Beginners sometimes think that Q-a7 is checkmate. But if white played Q-a7, the black king could escape to c8. True, white could checkmate on the next move, but then it wouldn't be a mate in one.

For most of the players, this was their first full season of netball, and it was a joy to see how far the team had come by the final game of the season. STEM

We need your help! Read on about how STEM implementation is going at our school, and how your workplace could collaborate with our classes to support authentic problem solving at East Marden.

You may be aware of the Department for Education's STEM Strategy 2017-2020, directing all public schools in South Australia to prioritise STEM Learning at their sites. STEM not only relates to the disciplines of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics – it describes a way of teaching that has students undertaking authentic, real-world challenges, problems or issues. Teaching teams have been experimenting with different ways of implementing STEM in their classrooms over 2018-2019 with a pupil free day dedicated to the Engineering Design Process, time for teachers to plan STEM units of work, an action team of STEM Student Leaders planning lessons for students R-7, opportunities for teachers to co-plan and co-teach with STEM Teacher Leaders, and a professional learning opportunity with Gever Tulley (founder of Brightworks School in San Francisco).

In Term 2, Ryan Parsons and I attended a range of STEM professional learning opportunities. One session run by the Department for Education in collaboration with UniSA gave us an insight into methods of evaluating STEM programs in schools and has resulted in us receiving a \$30,000 grant for teacher release and professional learning to undertake an evaluation at East Marden. Ryan Parsons, Carly Wilamowski and I will be responsible for collecting data, supporting STEM pedagogy in classrooms and writing the evaluation document over 2019-2020.

One of our goals over the next 12 months is to facilitate networks between East Marden classrooms and industry partners and evaluate the effectiveness on student achievement and teacher beliefs around the value of STEM pedagogy. One partnership we have forged between Campbelltown City Council will see the Year 3s in Julie McGrane's class and a Year 2/3 class from Thorndon Park Primary School design solutions to issues arising at the Campbelltown Community Orchard. Other connections we have begun to pursue include The ARC, SARAH Construction and Haigh's Chocolates.

Do you work for an industry that would be interested in collaborating with a classroom at East Marden? Ideally, the partnership would include an initial visit to the school from an industry contact or classrooms visiting an industry/business site, and finish with the industry contact evaluating student created solutions. We can support you to develop and articulate a problem or issue in your industry. Parking Around Schools – No Stopping versus No Parking

**THE STAFF CAR PARK IS NOT TO BE USED
BY PARENTS DURING THE HOURS OF
7AM - 5PM.**

No Stopping

Drivers must NOT STOP during indicated times for any reason in an area marked No Stopping, No Standing, as a Bike Lane or a Bus Zone or anywhere marked with a solid yellow line.



No Parking

Some schools have drop off and pick up (kiss n drop, kiss and ride, pick up/drop off) zones.

These are No Parking Zones during certain times that can be used for immediate drop off and pick up of passengers if these conditions are adhered to:

- The driver must always remain within 3 metres of the vehicle
- Drivers are only permitted to stop for 2 minutes to drop and pick up passengers
- No Parking is only for the times indicated and outside of that time it is unrestricted parking unless otherwise indicated

- In the afternoons, arrive after the bell has gone and allow time for your child to reach the No Parking Zone. If your child is not waiting to be collected DO NOT STOP, instead continue to circulate around and approach the No Parking Zone again.
- If you need to walk your child into school then you must park elsewhere.



“No Parking” Zones provide a safe place for children to be dropped off and picked up and allow for high turnover of vehicles. It works, if everyone follows the rules and does the right thing.
